



01 ABSTRACT

Community College transfer pathways are one key component to fostering diversity, equity, inclusion, affordability, and accessibility within architectural education. For over 20 years, the College of DuPage (COD) has been transferring students to the School of Architecture at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign (Illinois). While transfer pathways in architectural education are not uncommon, what makes this collaboration unique is the care and support that each institution provides students throughout the process. Since 2018, La Tanya Cobb from Illinois has been working with Mark Pearson from COD to facilitate best practices in transfer for architecture students. This collaboration, that both cherish, enhances the culture of each institution. Each year La Tanya visits COD to talk to potential transfer students about opportunities at Illinois. She continues to engage with these students when they visit her at the AIA college fair in Chicago. Most importantly she provides transfer students individualized advising and support after they commit to attending Illinois, making the process as welcoming and seamless as possible. This intentional relationship building, and student support model is the key to this programs ongoing and sustained success. COD students, due to the advising and support they receive, integrate seamlessly into the studio culture at Illinois. These students participate in student organizations, study abroad, and are often recognized with design awards at Illinois. Mark, an alumni of the program at Illinois, understands the rigor and preparation necessary for students to succeed after transfer. He visits Illinois often to maintain transfer relationships, participate in studio reviews, discuss curriculum alignment changes, and check in on his former students. This collaborative, supportive, transfer model has been spotlighted as a best practice at conferences and in webinars. Transfer collaborations like this help expand access to architectural education and provide pathways for students who might otherwise lack opportunities.




Virtual Studio










Interior Perspective / Seatings in Library & Outdoor Pasaage









